this local workforce development system to support their respective economic development strategies. We are also grateful to all the service providers in our system who deliver the resources and services to our customers.

This past year has been very successful for our Board. We have successfully implemented our business-focused marketing and promotion strategy, enhanced our interactive website, and launched several workforce initiatives including READI, JAO, and Career Pathways. These efforts have increased local business awareness and access to our services and resources, and has increased participation in our Sector Partnerships.

Our local and regional partnerships are stronger. The Jobs Waiting Program has hit its stride, overcoming several challenges, and is set to complete the Ready to Work component successfully next fall. Tech Hire is off to a strong start. Locally, our Just Add One Program, READI (Respect, Enthusiasm, Articulate, Dependable and Initiative), Reentry, and Volunteer Income Tax Assistance Program have all done well. Our demand-driven system has enabled more local businesses to take advantage of our services and resources including Work Tryouts, On-the-Job Training, Job Fairs, and Screenings.

We have a very active and participatory board membership. The bulk of this work was accomplished by the program staff, One Stop Partners and their respective staffs, as well as our contractors. The board appreciates everyone's individual and combined efforts and thanks you for your support.



Jobs Waiting what is it?

Jobs Waiting is a federally-funded regional job training program that aims to prepare long- and short-term unemployed individuals for jobs in the Hudson Valley's fastest-growing sectors—healthcare, advanced manufacturing, biotech, and information technology. Participants attend a free six-week career readiness training program called **Bootcamp** to prepare them for work and/or advanced training. Job seekers are assigned to a career coach who provides one-on-one counseling, and experienced job developers help to position and promote bootcamp graduates as job candidates to major employers throughout the Hudson Valley.

Employers who register as members of the Jobs Waiting program may apply for training fund reimbursement (up to 90% for 6 months) to help hire and train job seekers, saving time and money in the recruitment process.

results to date:

405 candidates have graduated from Bootcamp in Westchester and Putnam. 345 have been placed in healthcare jobs. 425 are in additional training. 73 employers have been approved for OJT or Work Tryout funds.

how to participate:

Career Centers across the Hudson Valley region recruit participants for the expanded Jobs Waiting program. Employers are invited to attend job fairs to meet and interview bootcamp graduates.





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Get on a Career Path that Really Takes You Somewhere



Career Pathways what is it?

Career Pathways is a 2-year program offered by the WPDWB that helps eligible candidates identify suitable career growth opportunities and pursue the required credentials necessary to attain higher-paying employment.

Career Pathways is a series of organized steps with multiple entry and exit points that lead participants toward careers in specific sectors by mapping out industry-recognized credentials, certificates, and/or licensures that lead them to better paying jobs. Career Pathways achieves this by linking candidates to a continuum of education and occupational training combined with intensive case-management, career exploration, and follow-up. Candidates are screened at the One Stop Career Centers and have an opportunity to get tuition assistance if eligible and when funding is available.

results to date:


Currently the WPWDB has mapped out career path charts in Healthcare, Biotechnology, Information Technology, and Advance Manufacturing and has identified 19 candidates to go through the 2-year program.

how to participate:

Candidates who want to pursue a career path and feel they meet the eligibility requirements to participate;

Education/Training Providers who have programs that provide credentials; Employers who have staff in need of additional training to increase earning opportunities.

what is it?

The Leadership Resource Group in collaboration with Robert P. Astorino, County Executive of Westchester County, Mary Ellen Odell, County Executive of Putnam, and the African American Advisory Board hold a oneday business academy for entrepreneurs, small business owners, and career seekers.

The vision is to provide a schedule of multi-track workshops featuring case studies that examine specific skill gaps in the areas of technology, finance/accounting, sales and marketing, and human resource management. Attendees leave the event with "success connections" and practical solutions, along with implementation plans to overcome the obstacles that hold them back from achieving their goals and ambitions.

results to date:

The Summit is in its third year. 250 people typically attend with 42 exhibitors.

how to participate:

Strive Forward

A national youth justice initiative funded by the U.S. Department of Labor provides education and employment services to youth between the ages of 16–24 who are involved in the justice system and reside in the City of Yonkers. Participating STRIVE Forward cities also include Boston, Chicago, New Haven, Philadelphia, and San Diego.

Westchester Development Academy for Youth (WDAY)

The WDAY provides educational and employment services for eligible youth 16–24 years of age under the Workforce Innovation Opportunity Act (WIOA). The WDAY program services are provided by designated youth program operators throughout Westchester and Putnam Counties. The program is designed to provide resources and services that will enable youth to complete high school and obtain a diploma/high school equivalency diploma, explore career opportunities, enroll in higher education and/or obtain employment.

Youth Workforce Programs

what is it?

Three year-round programs support education and employment for eligible youth ages 16 to 24— Westchester Development Academy for Youth (WDAY), Strive Forward, and YouthBuild.

Funded by the US Department of Labor, **YouthBuild** is a program for low-income youth ages 16–24 to earn their high school diploma or equivalent. The program also helps them learn skills needed to join the workforce, and give back to their communities by building affordable housing for low-income people while earning a stipend. The program runs from October 2015 to December 2018. Participants start with bootcamp training to learn construction skills. It takes place at Northern Westchester BOCES.

results to date:

YouthBuild: 80 youth from the communities of Peekskill, Mount Vernon, and Yonkers will be serviced by the program. In addition to helping improve the careers and opportunities of the youth participants, the local communities are aided by the development of low-income housing for needy families. 59 youth are currently enrolled in the program with 10 of them obtaining employment.

how to participate:

Construction employers are needed to help mentor and employ youth.

Job Fairs what is it?

The WPWDB holds or sponsors various job fair events throughout the year, as well as virtual job fairs online. Virtual job fairs focus on Middle Skills in May, Disabled Workers in October, and Veterans in November. Recruit Westchester is a large-scale job expo held at the Westchester County Center in November, attracting thousands of job-seekers to one location.

The One Stop Career Centers will also work with individual employers of any size to organize on-site targeted job fairs at one of our five locations. Businesses will receive priority service with dedicated workspace and screened candidates.

how to participate:

Employers are invited to create employer accounts at www.westchesterputnamonestop.com. Employers are added to the mailing list and will be kept informed of all activities. Job-seekers are encouraged to create an account on the website and attend a One Stop Orientation to gain access to all the programs and services.

Sector Business Partnership

what is it?

The WPWDB Business Sector Partnership was developed by public- and private-sector leaders to help identify their workforce challenges and provide resources to support area employers in an increasingly demanding, dynamic, and competitive market. The WPWDB Business Sector Partnership offers Westchester and Putnam County employers the opportunity to participate as members in 7 key industry sectors: 1) Advanced Manufacturing 2) Biotech 3) Green 4) Healthcare 5) Hospitality 6) Not-for-Profit 7) Professional Services

Sector members receive help in the form of Job Candidate Search/Screening, a free portal for posting jobs, and resume review. Employers may apply for new and/ or current worker training fund reimbursement in three categories:

- Customized Incumbent Worker Training: For individual businesses and their employees.
- On-the-Job (OJT) Training: Training for new employees (reduce training costs by 50%).
- Business Sector Customized Training: A collaborative training shared among businesses within an industry sector. (minimum of 3 businesses needed)

results to date:

Currently the WPWDB has registered 35 businesses within the 7 sectors.

Just Add One what is it?

Just Add One (JAO) is a 12-week business academy held at the Westchester Community College Entrepreneurial Gateway Center. Just Add One focuses on enhancing small business infrastructure through targeted trainings that will enable them to grow-and grow the local economy-by adding at least one new employee to their payroll. The curriculum addresses small- to medium-size business challenges like human resources, sales strategy, legal structure, accounting, leadership, and marketing. Instructors are a mix of current business owners and professors, with each attendee receiving a Coach and the opportunity to participate in Peer-to-Peer Meet-ups to keep them accountable to their goals. The sessions culminate in a presentation of a business plan to a panel that provides feedback and advice, and a June certificate ceremony.


results to date:

57 businesses have participated over two sessions.

2017 Voluntary Income Tax Assistance Earned Income Tax Credit Program

what is it?

For the 13th year WPWDB has coordinated and managed a group of volunteers who help prepare taxes under the **Volunteer Income Tax Assistance program** (VITA) to help residents take advantage of the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC). Tax returns were prepared for low- to moderate-income Westchester County Residents from February 1, 2017 to April 17, 2017.


VITA services can also extend past the tax season to year-round help. College students can get help filling out their financial aid forms and small businesses can get assistance with fixing erroneous tax returns.

results to date:

The IRS reported that this year the program helped 9,280 residents earn a total of 10.6 million in Federal and State refunds. 2.7 million was earned in tax credits and 4 million in other refunds. (Figures reported are for 2016 tax season.)

how to participate:

Volunteers are recruited within the months of November to December. Those who pass the test and screening are trained in January. They are then scheduled at 7 locations from February to April, filling roles such as greeters, tax preparers, translators, and call center operators. Anyone interested in volunteering can apply online at 211 or 1-800-899-1479.

Business Services

what is it?

The WPWDB was established in 2000 to help businesses of all sizes locate, train, and retrain employees to ensure their business is as competitive and successful as it can be. Businesses can use the One Stop Career Center website at no cost, as well as work with the business team to learn about and apply for the training fund reimbursements. There are multiple options for new hire or current employee training.

On-the-Job Training (OJT) WPWDB can reimburse a company for up to 50% of the costs of training, which helps compensate employers for the additional supervision associated with training a new employee. The amount of reimbursement depends upon the skills and experience of the new hire. There is a \$20,000 cap per company for OJT.

Customized Incumbent Worker Training When

current staff is provided with workforce training, WPWDB can pay for half the costs associated with in-house or third-party training. Customized classroom training helps raise the skill sets of employees, often in partnership with a training provider or school. There is a \$20,000 limit per company for customized training.



Youth Summit

what is it?

The Youth Summit is a one day career academy for Youth ages 16–24 who want to make connections, learn about viable career pathways, and practice strategies that build the skill sets needed to successfully enter the workforce. It is an interactive day with a robust agenda that features a motivational speaker, career exhibition, workshops, panel speakers, and networking. The youth connect with their business mentors and enthusiastically participate in the days activities.

results to date:

Over 1500 youth have attended the past six Youth Summits. The business community continues to show their commitment and investment in our future workforce by volunteering their time and energy.

how to participate:

Mentors are needed to help guide the interactive activities that teach teamwork. Employers who can provide internship and work tryout opportunities are invited to take an expo table.

TANF Summer Employment

Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) Summer Employment program provides subsidized job opportunities for youth ages 14–21 who meet TANF eligibility guidelines.

Foster Care Summer Employment

Helps young adults ages 16–24 obtain summer employment experience through opportunities provided by the Westchester County Parks and Recreation Department.





Summer Employment Initiative

what is it?

Summer youth employment programs are an effective strategy to ensure that youth gain valuable workforce experience and have a safe, productive way to spend their time. Some of these initiatives provide subsidized wages for youth who work at selected employers during the summer, and often include job readiness training and other supports for youth who participate.


Employment for youth are secured through a variety of programs and partners, that have distinct and overlapping eligibility requirements. **For example:** The WPWDB in conjunction with The Business Council of Westchester (BCW) coordinates a summer employment program with the goal of connecting 225 young adults with local employers. Youth agencies pre-screen and help prepare youth for jobs.

results to date:

Private Sector Summer Employment: Over 159 youth placed. TANF Summer Employment: Over 348 youth placed. Foster Care Summer Employment: Up to 40 youth placed. Strive for the Future: 75 youth



READI

what is it?

The WPWDB sponsored the creation of the **READI** curriculum as a way to inform and educate youth of the top five skill sets that will enable them to become successful employees and enhance their career development. The identified attributes are: Respect, Enthusiasm, Articulate, Dependable, Initiative. The program curriculum was developed and field tested and is currently being launched in partnership with Westchester Children's Association (WCA) in Peekskill, NY.

A critical component of the training is for the youth to be employed over the summer where they can put their new skills into immediate action. The Westchester Business Council leads the effort to connect youth to summer employment, as well as collecting employer feedback at the end of the employment period.


results to date:

READI is currently being rolled out in Peekskill and will expand throughout Westchester year- round.

how to participate:

We are looking for individuals and organizations to commit to nine training hours to learn the READI curriculum and then deliver the course to youth through their organizations, and/or train others within their agency.


